Exams are closed book but relevant data and equations will be provided. If classes are cancelled on a day of an exam is scheduled, the exam will be given at the next class period. Make up exams are only given when the student provides written documentation. You will need a scientific calculator for each exam and it is your responsibility to bring one.

There will be a Homework Assignment due every class period. Homework assignments will be posted on the web site and will usually be one or two problems based on the most recent lecture material. Homework assignments are due by 11:10 a.m. on the day indicated and late assignments will not be accepted. In the event that classes are cancelled by the University, then Homework assignments will be due the next class period.

Quizzes are unannounced and will be given at random times. Learning is most effective when you are continuously engaged in the subject matter.

Studying for Chemistry

For most students, chemistry is a difficult subject. The key to learning the material is to focus on the <u>process</u>, not the answer. This requires practice and to do as many practice problems as it takes to achieve mastery of each topic. You need to understand why you get to an answer, not just how – this will allow you to tackle problems you have not seen before.

You can get assistance in your studies of chemistry from the Chemistry Learning Center (Beaupre 115) and from the Academic Enhancement Center (4th floor, Roosevelt). The Chemistry Learning Center has graduate student tutors available during daytime hours throughout the week. The Academic Enhancement Center has help available during the evenings.

Academic Honesty

- Submitting the same paper for more than one course without prior approval from the instructors.
